Bill spent the next four years working his way up in the company, while putting in the time in the plumbing and piping apprenticeship program. At one point just before he graduated the program, Bill was using his

apprenticeship field hours to run a project as a superintendent. Bill earned his license in May 1989.

"I was so fortunate to work with some good people who took the time to mentor me and share their technical expertise with me," Bill says. Over time, Bill's natural leadership ability, together with his uncompromising work ethic, shaped his future with the company and carried him straight to the top. Bill was named President of TP Mechanical in August 2011.

"Possibilities are endless for people with a strong work ethic. TP Mechanical is a place of opportunity if you're willing to work for it," Bill says. "Do your job and do it well, because there is a customer depending on us to deliver what we promised."


# A Father's Legacy

When Scott Teepe Sr. was sifting through some old family albums, he found a card with a few words scrawled on the back – words that spoke volumes about his father, William (Bill) Teepe, and how he ran his plumbing business years ago.

"We lost my sister to brain cancer when she was only 7. The album I found was filled with cards and donations that had been made in her memory. I noticed that many of them were from clients of my Dad's," Scott explained.

On the back of a sympathy note from one of those clients was a handwritten quote that Bill must've been providing as a bid to a client for a sewer and water line.

"It was touching to read the sympathy note from a customer. My Dad built his business on client relationships, and the fact that a client took the time to send that to our family says a lot," Scott says.



As for the quote on the back, well, that's how Bill Teepe did things, as Scott recalls from the days he spent riding along with his father on the job.

Bill would take a look at the job, do the numbers in his head and then write out a quote on a napkin or a receipt he had in his pocket – whatever was available. If the customer thought it was a fair price, they moved forward with the job. Bill's customers didn't need formal contracts; they trusted him and knew he'd get the job done right.

"He probably had that sympathy card in his pocket when the client called him for a bid. In the midst of what must have been a difficult time for him, my Dad still took care of his clients and provided superior customer service," Scott says.

Scott remembers how his Dad brought out the best in people wherever he went; he made the workers laugh on the job sites and always earned a smile and a handshake from every customer he worked with.

That's because Bill Teepe's business philosophy was simple. He built the company on trust, rather than by being the lowest bidder. Steve Teepe served as President of the Company from 1977-1998 capitalizing on his father's attributes by organizing the business to allow for the growth that we have achieved over the years.

Today, under the guidance of Bill Riddle, TP Mechanical continues to thrive. Our company has enjoyed tremendous growth in recent years, which can be attributed to the strong relationships we've formed with partners and clients, and our solid history.



"Building relationships is valuable not only in business, but in life. What I learned from my father is to always do the right thing. If you do, you'll get repeat business because people will trust you to get the job done right," he says.

# BABY, IT'S COLD OUTSIDE...

# ...but we're not afraid of a little snow, wind and ice on our construction sites.

Why? Because we have extensive safety measures in place to keep our workers warm and secure when they're out in the field.

Careful planning and preparation are the keys to safety in wintry conditions. When the temperature plummets, here's a little TP Mechanical advice that keeps our workforce and job sites accident-free:

### Dress for a not-so-winter-wonderland.

We all know that not wearing enough warm clothing can cause hypothermia. However, dressing too warmly is just as dangerous. In cold weather, sweat refreezes to the body and cools the core temperature over time. Wear breathable layers and don't forget gloves and hats.



### Glow like Rudolph.

In snowy, blustery weather, visibility decreases. TP Mechanical provides workers with reflective vests and jackets to help them stand out against the white-out weather. Our equipment operators are trained to recognize hazardous conditions and to shut down when visibility is dangerously low.

### No ice skating on the job.

We keep at least 50 lbs. of salt at every job site and lay down gravel to ensure safe footing. When it comes to snow and ice inside open buildings, we'll install temporary heating units or fire up area heaters to melt the ice then use squeegees to clear out the water.

### Pick up your toys.

Proper storage of equipment and supplies is vital. We lock ladders, fall protection equipment, harnesses, lanyards and tools inside on-site gang boxes to ward off slippery snow and ice and protect them from being damaged by the elements.

### If road conditions require a sleigh, time to close down the job site.

Sometimes, it's just too treacherous to drive on the roads to come to work or to operate equipment. TP Mechanical superintendents are trained to use their best judgment and close our sites down when conditions become dangerous. As a company, our policy is to close down during Level 3 emergencies.

We don't gamble when it comes to safety, especially during the winter months. TP Mechanical's prepared for whatever winter throws our way and so we say, **let it snow**, **let it snow**.

### Tight timeline? Bring it on.

We like challenging projects and aggressive timelines; unusual circumstances and intricate details are our specialty.
